



# "Forgiveness"

"If we confess our sins, He is faithful and righteous to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness." ~ 1 John 1:9 (HCSB)

We talk about forgiveness quite a bit. I think I've even written about it here before. Christians are expected to extend forgiveness to others (whether we think they deserve it or not), yet we don't always understand what it is that we are actually discussing. In psychology, forgiveness is generally explained as a conscious and deliberate decision to let go of feelings of resentment toward a person (or people) who has (have) caused you some form of harm (emotional or physical). Forgiveness is not condoning or excusing someone else's negative actions, nor does it remove any repercussions that stem from their actions toward you.

Why would I want to forgive someone anyway? From a non-religious standpoint, forgiveness allows me to let go of the anger that I carry toward others for things they've done. Extending forgiveness allows me to live my life unburdened by the resentment that I carry towards other people for things they have done. People who forgive others tend to live emotionally healthier lives.

In other words, modern psychology tells us that God was right. It tells us that God knows what He is doing when He commands us to love one another and to forgive one another. Because God wants us to share in the abundance of life, He has told us the steps we can take to make our lives more enjoyable. Sharing grace and forgiveness with others leads to happier and healthier people.

One aspect of forgiveness that we often do not talk about is the ability to forgive ourselves. We really cannot extend forgiveness to others if we cannot forgive ourselves for the hurts that we have caused others (and ourselves). We really cannot forgive ourselves if we do not accept that God has forgiven us completely.

In the verse above (1 John 1:9), we are told that if we confess our sins, God is faithful and will forgive us our sins. If we accept that the Bible is the Word of God, then we accept this statement as fact. When we confess our sins to God (this does include repenting), God will forgive us. On the cross, Christ paid the price for our sins... all of them - past, present, and future. If you have accepted Christ as your Lord and Savior, you have confessed and repented. You are forgiven. So why don't you let it go? Stop carrying around the guilt for sins from 20 years ago - or even from last week. Give it to God and let Him

deal with it. As a child of God, you are promised the peace of Christ. Accept God's offer of peace. Welcome the Holy Spirit into your life and let God be in charge.

If you still cannot let it go, maybe you need to make amends with the person you sinned against. Reach out in love and faith and let the healing power of God work in your life. No matter what happens, know that in Christ you have the forgiveness of your sins and that they will not be held against you come judgment day. Trust God... you are forgiven and made new. Once you accept that, you will begin to enjoy true peace.

### **Pastor Matt Report**

Has a whole month seriously gone by since I last wrote one of these? It gives a whole new meaning to "...a thousand years is like a day"! Plus, given the current "Winter Wonderland" state of things, I'm not so sure we haven't jumped forward in time a couple months...anyways, I've got some good stuff to update you all on, beginning with youth ministry!

On October 1st we had our youth worship one-month check-in, and received two excellent suggestions from the youth regarding our format. First, they suggested splitting up the worship songs instead of frontloading all of them; it's nice to begin and end with worship. Secondly, students noted how much they missed doing Bible discussions in the Lighthouse and feeling more connected to each other. It's hard to feel connected when we're spread out in the sanctuary and mostly looking at the back of each others' heads, so the last couple Thursdays we have been spread out in a circle downstairs in the Fellowship Hall. It's been great! Student engagement in our Gospel of John discussions has been much better, and we feel more like a unified group. Furthermore, by time of publication we will have completed our first youth activity outside of Thursday youth worship! It was suppooooosed to be a hike, but October's snowpocalypse made the trail, shall we say...less hospitable. In lieu, we are gathering (Or will have gathered? I struggle with this concept of writing about events that haven't happened as if they have happened) on October 31 at 10am at the church for ultimate frisbee, hot chocolate, apple cider, popcorn and devotional/prayer time, and It's The Great Pumpkin, Charlie Brown! A holiday classic, indeed.

Discipleship group is also continuing apace. We settled on watching one episode each week of the 10-part Truth Project series "Does God Exist?" and exploring the logical and scientific arguments for belief in a Creator. Our discipleship students are all 1-2 years away from high-school graduation, and our goal is to strengthen their faith to withstand challenges that often come in post-secondary education settings, and to be a better witnesses to Christ for anyone who might see science as a roadblock to faith in God. So far, it's been interesting and helpful to explore the major worldviews that encompass the various types of faith traditions (including Atheism) of the world, as well as the strong case for Theism over the alternatives of Pantheism, Naturalism/Materialism, and soon Deism.

In other areas of consummate associate pastorism (not a real word, but I'll use it anyway), I've also been talking with Gary and Darna of the Evangelism Committee about a potential ministry we as a church could get involved in beginning next year. We are very much early in the conversation, so Jim or I will let you know more at a later date, depending on how everything goes. Finally, I'm thankful to the church Council for, after careful consideration, agreeing to bring me on as a permanent staff member at ODCC. The short amount of time I have had to work and build relationships with Jim, Eileen, the youth, and many of you has been awesome, and I'm so thankful to our Lord that I get to continue in this work of pursuing the mission of our church. Thank you everyone: with God, the best is yet to come!

#### **Moderator Message** by Bob Arnold

Our church activities continue to grow even during this period where activities by many churches have been curtailed to minimize the potential negative impact of COVID 19. Amazingly our church has done well during this period thanks due to the efforts of our pastors and the many members that have eagerly stepped up to the challenge. Our church finances seem to be in good order with giving keeping up with our budget needs.

The community needs for supplemental food are being addressed with the weekly Monday giving of 100's of boxes of food made available from Second Harvest. Karen Luiten has been organizing this program with amazing support from church members. We are also participating in the support of the Bite2Go program at Arcadia elementary. Many kids have food support during the week at school. These kids often do not have any food support for the weekends. The Bite2Go program endeavors to provide supplemental non-perishable food from Second Harvest for these kids on the weekends. Vickie has agreed to haul this food to the school each Friday. This food support comes from Second Harvest at a cost of \$5 per weekend per child, \$180 per year or \$400 per month for 10 months. We as a church have committed to providing support for 20 kids for the year. More than \$1000 has already been committed by church members for this program. If you wish to participate simply earmark any giving you wish to the Bite2Go program.

We also provide support from our church endowment funds to the three food banks in the area: The Greenhouse in Deer Park, and the North County Food Bank in Elk and Loon Lake Food Bank. This year the amounts given to each was \$900.

I would encourage all to participate in our weekly Sunday service. We still have environmentally safe seating available! A new service at 1PM Sunday exists without singing to further minimize the possibility of any COVID 19 transmission. Internet service works well for those who have a good high speed internet connection. For those who don't, the FM radio connection in our parking lot at 90.7 on the FM dial works very well.

Bob and Donna Syron are having continuous medical challenges. Please continue your prayers for them.



### **Evangelism Committee** By Darna Michie

With less than 2 months until Christmas Season and a time recognized for giving (which in my mind the season of giving should be year round), you may be interested in a program named "Operation Christmas Child".

#### What is Operation Christmas Child?

The Samaritan's Purse project Operation Christmas Child collects shoebox gifts-filled with fun toys, school supplies and hygiene items—and delivers them to children in need around the world to demonstrate God's love in a tangible way. For many of these children, the gift—filled shoebox is the first gift they have ever received.

This is a project that the Evangelism Committee is considering presenting as a worldwide outreach mission for our church beginning in 2021, however in the meantime, here's how you can help now if you wish to make a difference in the life of a child. I've also included a little history of the program.

Participants who prefer the convenience of online shopping can browse **samaritanspurse.org/buildonline** to select gifts matched to a child's specific age and gender, then finish packing the virtual shoebox by adding a photo and personal note of encouragement.

Since 1993, Operation Christmas Child, the world's largest Christmas project of its kind, has collected and delivered more than 178 million shoebox gifts to children in more than 160 countries and territories.

In 2020, Operation Christmas Child hopes to collect enough shoebox gifts to reach another 11 million children in countries like Peru, the Philippines, Rwanda and Ukraine. More than 10.5 million shoebox gifts were collected worldwide in 2019, with more than 8.9 million collected in the U.S.

Operation Christmas Child is a project of Samaritan's Purse, an international Christian relief and evangelism organization headed by Franklin Graham. Samaritan's Purse currently works in more than 100 countries to provide aid to victims of war, disease, disaster, poverty and famine.

Delivered into the hands of children through local churches within their own country, every shoebox gift is an opportunity to share about Jesus Christ and God's love.

Since 2009, more than 23 million children who have received a shoebox gift have participated in The Greatest Journey—a 12-lesson discipleship program. Children learn from trained, local volunteers what it means to follow Jesus and share their faith with friends and family.

### **Haiti Mission Letter** by Gene Gentry

process of being developed at the Northern Haiti Christian University. Since that time Max (September article) has updated the proposed budget for the poultry equipment, house, feed, chicks, and other items necessary to get started. In 2016 Mike and I proposed starting small and getting experience and seeing how things come together before implementing a larger production. This is even more important now.

In August I wrote about a proposed poultry project program which is in

Haiti purchases meat and eggs from the Dominican Republic on the same island. Chicken and eggs are expensive, and the supply is limited. The original proposition was with the church development committee. That did not get started but plans developed to work with the University. A couple of years ago the University laid a foundation and poured about a third of the floor.

The goals of the project are threefold:

- Provide practical experience for agricultural students studying animal production.
- Learn and share with others useful information about resources available for a successful project.
- Provide chicken for the University and the surrounding community at rea sonable costs.

Eventually, provide opportunity for people in Upper Limbe to start their own poultry projects both for food and income to support their families.

You may be asking, "Why do this now? It was during the summer, in July, when I was told by the Dean of Agriculture that Max was interested in helping get the project restarted. The president of the University, Pastor Dona, had been very encouraging, in previous years but the original writer or the first proposal did not step up to do the project. When I heard of this possibility, during the Covid 19 pandemic, I called Pastor Dona and asked if this was an appropriate time to move ahead. He replied, "Now is the time to move ahead." I then asked Max to update the 2016 proposal's estimate with appropriate changes. I now have additional input and have discussed essentials with the US Helping Haitians Agriculture team and recommend moving ahead.

I would appreciate your prayers for the future of the "Helping Haitians" mission. Even though we are not taking teams in now because Covid 19 and political problems, the animal treatment program continues, the Video Chat Club continues to function (We could use US volunteers to pair up with Haitians), and we continue to search for better ways to communicate.

Based on Max's adjusted budget, inflation, and unexpected startup expenses I estimate the need for \$4,000 to get the basic project implemented. If you feel led to support the poultry project, the veterinary program, the English program or the program in general checks can be made to "Helping Haitians" and given to Gail Brown, Gene Gentry or mailed or left at the Open Door Church office.
